

# Active and Passive 'voices'

#### **Active voice**

The most common way of saying anything! A typical sentence in the active voice is:

> subject – verb – adjective Susan is happy

or

subject (of 1<sup>st</sup> interest) – verb – object (of 2<sup>nd</sup> interest)

The cat is chasing the mouse

# **Passive voice**

Use this when the adjective or the object receiving the action are more important than the subject.

Only in

adjective – verb – subject happy is Susan

or

object (of 1st interest) – verb – [subject (of 2nd interest)]

the mouse is being chased [by the cat]

## Passive voice – use of verbs

The verb in the passive voice in English is made from two elements:

```
'to be' (in correct tense) + past participle

present

present

present

continuous

The house is being built of wood (by .....)

past

The house was built of wood (by .....)

future

The house will be built of wood (by .....)
```

# When to use (& when not to use) the passive voice

- Use the passive voice when
  - you are interested in the object, not in the person or thing that's the subject
  - you don't know who (or what) is the subject
  - you don't want to say who (or what) is the subject
  - talking about "being born"
  - the verb is usually followed by "to" + a simple or "-ing" verb
  - writing formal reports (in some situations / organisations)
- Use the active voice if you can!

# **Usually active not passive!**

Passive	Active
Your happiness will be shown by a big smile at the camera.	A big smile at the camera will show your happiness.
Our planet is surrounded by the ozone layer.	The ozone layer surrounds our planet.
Nottingham's waste is disposed of at a site near Burntstump.	Nottingham disposes of its waste at a site near Burntstump.

# **Examples** when the subject isn't relevant

#### The active voice is preferred.

(= we are interested in the active voice, not in who uses it.)

#### The house was built in 1654.

(= we are interested in the house, not in who built it.)

#### The road is being repaired.

(= we are interested in the road, not in the people doing the repairs.)

#### The gate has been opened and the cows have escaped.

(= we don't know who opened the gate, but 'who' did it isn't important!)

#### My car has been stolen.

(= I don't know who stole my car.)

# Convert these: Passive → Active

- "Bohemian Rhapsody" was written by Queen.
- This Baptist church building was built in 1863.
- In July, while campaigning to become president of the USA, Donald Trump was almost killed by Thomas Crooks.
- Film stars usually hate being interviewed.
- Before getting a visa you have to be tested for typhoid.

### Possible Active Versions

- Queen wrote "Bohemian Rhapsody".
- Baptists built this church building in 1863.
- In July, while campaigning to become president of the USA, Thomas Crooks almost killed Donald Trump.
- Film stars usually hate interviews.
- Before getting a visa you must have a typhoid test.
