for example	e:		
Hour	"ow" sound followed by "a"		
Choir	"igh" sound followed by "a"		
Vis <mark>ua</mark> l	"ure" sound followed by "a"		
But mostly th	But mostly there's a pause between the double vowel sound and the		
next vowel:			
Lower	"oh" sound , then a pause, then "a"		
Flower	"ow" sound , then a pause, then "a"		
Buyer	"igh" sound , then a pause, then "a"
