# **Introducing Modal Verbs**

- Used to describe uncertainty, certainty, suggestion, obligations, probability or ability, or to ask (or give) permission
- Go in front of present tense
- I/You/He/She/It/We/They forms are all the same (no final 's' for He/She/It.

# 9 common modal verbs

can	may	must	shall	will
ability /	uncertainty	obligation	= will	certainty
permission				
could	might	-	should <sup>2</sup>	would <sup>1</sup>
possibility	unlikely		obligation +	Uncertain due
			uncertainty	to a difficulty

<sup>1</sup> Also used as past tense of 'will'

<sup>2</sup> "ought to" has the same meaning

#### Examples: something certain, possible or impossible

- My keys must be in the car.
- It might rain tomorrow.
- That can't be Peter's coat. It's too small.
- I can't swim.

#### **Examples: requests and requirements**

- May I ask a question?
- Could I have some tea, please?
- Would you like some help?
- You must read the instructions.
- You may bring a friend.
- Everyone should come with a packed lunch.

### Add "have" and the past participle when the uncertainty is in the past

- He might have caught the bus.
- He can't have walked very far in 10 minutes.
- She would have waited for at least 15 minutes before phoning.
- It could have been a disaster. But, fortunately, the fire engine arrived very quickly.
